LONGVIEW LIONS CLUB ACTIVITIES HIGHLIGHTS DURING THE PAST FIFTY-FIVE YEARS.

1950 - 1951: W.A. Lutz, President.

District Governor Jack Stickley visited the club during December and gave an address to the club. Club received front-page recognition in the Hickory Daily Record for securing wheelchairs and crutches for the use by members of our community.

Front-page recognition was received by the club for its part in sponsoring the Beacon Safety Club at Longview School.

Club completely rebuilt and refurnished the home of a widow woman whose home was destroyed by fire.

1951 – 1952: William J. Smith, President

Club painted Safety Zones on the highway at each end of Longview School. The club secured the approval of the State Highway Department to paint these zones and the club was informed that the State of NC may adopt the design for use all over the state.

The outstanding project of the club since it's organization was the production of "Shooting Stars". The members of the club staged this entire production and a net profit of \$1,132.24 was raised with 560 man-hours of work.

1952 - 1953: Dewey A. Houston, President

Club sponsored and organized the Longview Volunteer Fire Department. This highly successful project was celebrated on February 14, 1953 with the completion of the building to house the Department. Open house was held and several hundred citizens of the community attended this gala occasion. This was the club's largest undertaking to date. During a period of six months the club sponsored and organized the Longview Volunteer Fire Department and immediately began raising funds for this building. The club donated \$500.00 and various firms and individuals in the community donated the balance. Less than \$300.00 was spent for labor on the building, the balance of the labor being performed by the club members. A total of 750 man hours. It was most remarkable that the club, at a cost of \$4,500.00 was able to build this building whose assessed value was approximately \$12,000.00.

1953 – 1954: R.M. Moretz, President.

During this year the club sponsored and published it's first bulletin.

Club sponsored a drive and was successful in obtaining Dr. Walter E. Leonard to practice medicine in Longview.

Club also sponsored and was successful in securing a clinic building for Dr. Leonard. Open House was held on July 15, 1954 at this new clinic building with hundreds of Longview citizens in attendance at this celebration.

A burned out family was helped in securing household furnishings. A compete 5-room house was furnished through the efforts of the club for this family.

1954 – 1955: F.V. Marshall, President.

Club sponsored a most successful Fix-up, Clean-up, Paint-up Week when the members of the club carted off 14 truckloads of rubbish from the community.

A distinct honor to the club during this year was the appointment of our own R.M. Moretz as Zone Chariman to serve under our District Governor.

A highly successful Womanless Wedding was held which netted the club \$300.00 in profit.

The first Family Night Picnic was held during this year. It has continued as one of our most enjoyable and entertaining occasions for our Lion family.

1955 – 1956: Russell Robinson, President.

Club sponsored the First Soapbox Derby. This event was highly praised in the local newspaper and on the local radio stations. There were close to a thousand spectators to view this race. This event was also highly praised in our local newspaper and radio stations for the club's activity in sponsoring projects for the benefit of the boys in our community. Pictures of this event were also published in the Hickory Daily Record.

The club sponsored safety Week in the community during the year. Hundreds of Safety Stickers were placed on cars urging safe driving.

Club entertained the Longview School Safety Patrol during this year.

One of our most successful Broom Sales to date was held during this year with the club having \$1,251.00 total sales and a net profit of \$560.00.

1956 – 1957: Clyde C. Abernathy, President

Another most successful Womanless Wedding was held during this year. Dr. Walter Leonard was Guest Speaker to the Claremont and Rutherford College Lions Clubs during this year.

The highlight of this year was the staging of another successful and highly entertaining Soapbox Derby. The winners in this race were sent to Charlotte to compete to represent North Carolina in the national event in Akron, Ohio.

1957 – 1958: Linwood Brittain, President.

Club sponsored and decorated the first Christmon Tree at Longview School for the enjoyment of the community during the Christmas season. This has become an annual affair.

Very successful Soapbox Derby was held along with highly successful Ladies Night, Family Night, and an excellent Golden Agers Night.

The club began a record of perfect attendance the first meeting night in February of this year. The remainder of this year saw the club continue with 100% perfect attendance. This was an accomplishment, which all members of our club still hold with pride. The club sponsored a very successful and entertaining Talent Show during this year.

1958 - 1959: Dr. Walter E. Leonard, President.

Club made a \$4.00 per member contribution to the Lake Wacamaw Boys Home during this year. Longview was one of the first Lions Clubs to contribute to this worthy organization. The club was recognized and commended at the State Convention in New Bern for participating in this worthy cause.

Another first was scored by the club by being one of the first Lions Clubs to contribute \$1.00 per member to the N.C. Eye Bank.

During this year three new committees were set up as follows:

Ways & Means, Eye Bank, and Retention.

Club sponsored and operated our first Fair Booth concession stand at the Catawba County Fair. All members of the club enjoyed working together on this project; the fellowship was outstanding and we realized a net profit of \$800.00.

The first Spelling Bee at Longview School was held during this year. This is to an annual event.

1959 – 1960: Eugene Elliott, President.

Club again sponsored the Fair Booth Concession stand at the Catawba County Fair.

The Catawba County Lions Float in the Old Soldiers Reunion Parade in Newton was co-sponsored by our club for the first time.

Club sponsored and held an excellent Fruitcake Sale during November and December, realizing a profit of \$205.00.

One of our outstanding highlights of this year was the club sponsoring and holding our first Teacher's Appreciation Night. The teachers of Longview School and the Superintendent and Board Members of the Hickory City School Board were guests of the club. Many favorable comments were received and the teachers have stated that this was one of the best gestures of appreciation that they have received since becoming a member of the teaching profession.

Golden Agers Night was celebrated with our largest attendance to date. A total of 61 Golden Agers were present.

Highlights of this year were completed with the club holding International Councilors Night with Lion Judge Jim Farthing of Lenoir as our guest speaker.

1960 – 1961: Sam Parlier, President Albert Crump, Secretary


Lions Ray Cooke, James Gilland and Harold Frye attended the International Convention in Chicago, Illinois. Club formed a bowling league. Club was honored to have Lion Eugene Elliott appointed as Zone Chairman. Lions held family outing in August of 1960. Golden Agers Night in November with 61 present. White cane Drive in October – total raised \$170.00. Chairman of this drive was Lion Ray Cooke. Club bought uniforms and flags for safety patrol at Longview School. District Governor W.O. Corey visited the club's first meeting in December. Club was host to the teacher's of Longview School February 21, 1961. Spelling Bee held at Longview School in March. Club gave \$40.00 to North Carolina Eye Bank. Lion Robert Ledbetter sent football to an exchange student in Norway. In April of 1961 Longview Lions Club co-sponsored the bloodmobile. Club paid \$50.00 to Boy Scout Troop #248.



1961 - 1962;

Artie Mull, President Robert Ledbetter, Secretary

Lion Ray Cook was killed in a plane crash July 3, 1961 which was a deep loss for the club and community. Longview Lions Bowling League Team won the tournament, bringing back a trophy to the den. In August, the club gave \$25.00 to the Senior Citizens Club of Hickory. October 1961, roadblock was held for White Cane Drive - \$627.30 was collected. Lion Horace Tallant was Chairman. November 1961, Golden Agers night was observed with Judge James C. (Jim) Farthing of Lenoir as guest speaker. Seventy-three Golden Agers were present. Fruitcakes were given to the Ladies and hosiery to the men. Baxter Greene, fruit cake chairman, reported 900 lbs. Of cakes were sold. Club voted to send \$40.00 to Lake Waccamaw Boys Home. December 1961, treats were given to children of Longview area and ten food baskets were taken to the needy. Mid-winter Convention was held in Morganton with President Artie Mull and Secretary Robert Ledbetter attending. The Spelling Bee was held at Longview School the third Monday of April 1962. First prize of \$10.00, second prize \$5.00. Horace Tallant, Chariman. April of 1962, Broom Sale was held with 150 man-hours donated.

1962 – 1963: Robert G. Frye, President L.R. Hawkins, Secretary

July 1962, The community Building Joint Civic Committee was formed to see if we could build a community center in Longview. Robert Frye was appointed as General Chariman of this committee. Other committee members appointed were: Lions Club: Co-Chairmen, Russell Robinson and Ralph Dale - R.M. Moretz, Arnold Frye, Bill Marlowe, Linwood Brittain, Joe Brannock, Sherman Butler, Gene Elliott and Bill Norris, Secretary. Optimist Club: Elmer Huffman, Dick King, Vernon Guest, Fred Hall, Tom Hinson, Jess Danner, Jim Colbert, Burl Winebarger. Garden Club: Edith Ledbetter, Treasurer. Home Demonstration Club: Mrs. Grady Coffin, Mrs. Linwood Brittain. Opti-Mrs.: Mrs. Elmer Huffman, Mrs. Fred Hall. As a whole, the club is indebted to the President, Lion Robert Frye for his extra efforts and work to make this project successful. 1,280 man-hours were spent soliciting money for this project of \$25,000.00. District Governor John H. Roberts was invited to the club meeting to install new members into the club on the 2nd meeting in October. Blind and Visually handicapped outing held in September at Moss' Farm. Six attended and a gift of \$10.00 was given to each. Club voted to sponsor a Glaucoma Clinic and to invite Hickory and St. Stephens Lions to join us in this project. The following committee was in charge of arrangements: Dr. W.E. Leonard, Eugene Elliott, Baxter Greene, and Leon Miller. White Cane Road Block was held and the club collected \$685.45 on September 29 and 30. Lion Dr. W.E. Leonard was chairman, assisted by Horace Tallant and Archie Ervin. Club sponsored a float in the Old Soldier's Reunion parade. Lion Eugene Elliott was appointed to the committee of Boys Home at Lake Waccamaw. In, November 1963, Board voted and purchased two wheel chairs and later one additional chair. Golden Ages night was observed November 20, with 63 present. Ladies Night and Christmas party was held in December. Baskets were distributed to eleven needy families. International Councilors were invited to visit our club. Teacher's Appreciation Night was observed along with the Hickory City School Board and the Town of Longview Councilmen. 120 dozen household and industrial brooms were sold. Club was host for our 3rd Zone meeting of the year held March 5th. Spelling Bee sponsored at Longview School in April 1963. 121 Eye Wills were secured in April. Charter night was observed in June 1963.

1963 – 1964: Sherman Butler, President Bill Norris, Secretary

Robert Frye was installed as Zone Chairman of Zone 5 in July 1963. Lions Family Picnic was held at Optimist Park August 17. Outing for the Blind and Visually handicapped was attended by 4 Lions with 3 guests. Gifts of \$33.75 were presented. Past President Lion Artie Mull presented Lion Robert Frye a gold Elgin watch for the many hours and his efforts on the new Community Center which was dedicated May 3, 1964, from 2:00pm - 5:00pm. Club purchased a radio for the blind. President Lion Sherman Butler presented the plaque, representing the winner in the Division for 1962-1963 Lions International attendance contest, to Past President Lion Robert Frye. The first Zone 5 meeting was held September 3 at the Longview Club. Club entered a team in the Catawba County Lions Bowling League. Ladies night was held at Shuford's Recreation Area on Lake Hickory September 17. White Cane Drive was held in October with a total of 144 man-hours donated by the club. Chairman of White Cane, Lion Bill Wooldridge, reported a total of \$904.22 raised for this drive. Golden Agers night was observed November 19 with seventy-three present. Gifts were presented each Golden Ager. Club gave thirty-four Christmas treats to need families in Longview area. Club also made a donation to the Boys Home at Lake Waccamaw. A donation of \$25.00 was given to Ridgeview High School to help pay for football bleachers. Club decorated tree and Christmas Scene at Longview School. Teacher's Appreciation Night was held January 21. Gifts were presented to the guests. Five Lions and their wives attended mid-winter Convention in Hendersonville, NC on Saturday, January 21, 1964. International councilor's night was observed in February. Club co-sponsored Bloodmobile Drive February 6, 1964 and obtained 186 pints of blood. Club provided transportation at three schools for Polio Clinic on March 22, 1964. Longview Lions, Hickory Lions, and St. Stephens Lions Clubs held a Glaucoma Clinic on April 14 and 15, 1964, processing 2,591 persons. Broom Sale was held April 23 and 24 with 240 man-hours donated by the club. Club held Sons and Daughters Banquet on April 21, 1964. Club obtained 179 Eye Wills at Glaucoma Clinic. Lion Dr. W.E. Leonard was chairman of the Glaucoma Clinic. Club paid \$182.68 as cost for the Glaucoma Clinic. State Convention was attended in Raleigh, N.C. by four lions. The total Broom Sales were \$2,475.00. Charter members were honored at June 2nd meeting.

1964 – 1965: Hubert M. Brooks, President Baxter Greene, Secretary

Lion Robert Frye was elected Deputy District Governor. Lion's Grady Coffin and President Brooks and wives attended Lions International Convention in Toronto, Canada. A Lions banner was purchased for the club. Seven Visually Handicapped and Blind attended the outing for the Blind, along with thirteen Lions from our club. The Longview Lions Club held it's Family Picnic for all Lions and families at Optimist Park above Morganton in August 1964. A ladies night and Hobo party was held in September. Lion Sherman Butler was chairman of this event. Club sponsored a bowling team. Thirty Lions worked a total of 120 man-hours on Road Block for the White Cane Drive. Lion Walter Traxler was chairman and a total of \$922.46 was collected. Club paid \$285.00 on chairs and tables for Longview Recreation Center. Golden Agers night was held November 1964 with sixty-nine Senior Citizens attending. Ladies Night and Christmas party was held on December 15, 1964. Club contributed \$129.00 to Boys Home at Lake Waccamaw. Welfare Committee prepared food baskets for the needy families and children for a total of \$168.00. Fruit cake committee and club sold over 3,000 lbs of fruitcakes. Lion Artie Mull was chairman for this committee. District Governor Robert (Bob) Davis visited the club in December. Lions held the annual Teacher's Appreciation Night along with the School Board and the Town

Board in January 1965. Seven Lions and Lionesses attended the Mid-winter Convention in Statesville in January 1965. International Councilors night was observed in February 1965. Lions Bill Norris, Sherman Butler and two Lionesses spent 118 man hours testing the eyes of the fourth and sixth grade students at Longview School. Annual Spelling Bee was held in April 1965. Club co-sponsored the bloodmobile in April. Club paid \$150.00 for eye examining equipment for Catawba County Clinic. A very successful broom sale was held in April 1965. Lion Linwood M. Brittain was chairman of this committee. Eye Will booths were set up at First National Bank, Fresh Air Super Market, and Martin's Super Market in Longview in April. Eighty-three eye wills were secured. Chairman of this committee was Lion Rev. James Rowles. Charter Night and Fifteenth Anniversary to be observed on June 15th, 1965.

1965 – 1966: Robert Ledbetter, President Earl Mickle, Secretary

The Longview Lions Club was selected as the best Lions Club and won the best Attendance Award for District 31-B for clubs of it's size for the year 1965-66, Lion Robert Frye served the club as White Cane Chairman for the year and raised \$1,576.00 for the District annual White Cane Drive. The club held it's annual Fruit Cake sale in November and December and made a profit of \$900.00. Our annual Broom Sale was held during the month of May and the club realized a profit of \$1,500.00 from our house to house and industrial brooms. A Blood Drive was held for the American Red Cross, which was very successful. President Robert Ledbetter and wife Edith attended the Lions International Convention, which was held in Los Angeles. Lions Robert Frye and Hubert Brooks attended the N.C. Lions State Convention as delegates of the club. Our annual Golden Ages Night was held in February with 75 Senior Citizens of the community in attendance. The meal, gifts, and entertainment amounted to a cost of \$595.00. At Christmas, fruit baskets were distributed to the needy in the community at a cost of \$250.00. The club made contributions to the following District Monetary goals: \$1,576.00 to White Cane, \$100.00 to NC Eye Bank, and \$200.00 to the Boys and Girls Home. Teacher's Appreciation Night was held for the teachers of Longview Elementary School along with the Hickory City School Board and the Town of Longview Town Councilmen. The meal and gifts amounted to \$325.00. A Spelling Bee was held at Longview Elementary School with the winners awarded savings bonds for a total of \$40.00. Lion Robert Frye, Lou, Janet, and Carole attended the Lion's International Convention in Chicago along with Lion Hubert Brooks and Betty as delegates of the Longview Lions Club.

1966 – 1967: L.R. Hawkins, President Earl Mickle, Secretary

The highlight of this year was the election of Robert Frye as District Governor of District 31-B. He selected Lion Hubert Brooks to serve as District 31- Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer and Lion Bill Woolridge was appointed District 31-B Director of Public Relations. Golden Agers Night was held in November with 85 senior citizens present. The meal, gifts, and entertainment cost the club a total of \$675.00. The club met its District 31-B Monetary goals with contributions to the following: White Cane - \$1,176.00, N.C. Eye Bank - \$110.00 and Boys and Girls Home - \$225.00. Our annual Fruitcake Sale was held in November and December with the club making a profit of \$950.00. Our Broom Sale during the month of May made a profit of \$1,600.00. Longview Lions Club has realized profits from projects amounting to approximately \$65,875.33. This money has been raised from projects such as: Broom Sales, Paper Drive, donkey Basketball, Box Supper, Minstrel Show, Concession Booths, Fruit Cake Sales, Talent Show, White Elephant Sale, Pancake Breakfasts, Road Blocks, and other projects.

Club expenditures for our blind work, welfare work, and other worthy projects have amounted to approximately \$64,333.13. This money has been spent on such worthy projects such as: wheelchairs, crutches, groceries, fuel, dental work, clothing, Golden Agers Night, Christmas Baskets, March of Dimes, Library Books, Longview Volunteer Fire Department, Longview Recreation Center, glasses, hearing aids, the Longview swimming pool, and other blind projects.

The club has raised the amount of \$33,823.35 during our White Cane Drives.

The club has secured 938 eye wills for the North Carolina Eye Bank.

Four hundred ninety-five pairs of glasses and/or eye examines have been purchased.

Club has raised over \$29,000.00 for the Longview Recreation Center by soliciting money.

Wheelchairs belonging to the club have been loaned out for a total of 825 times.

The club has also loaned crutches for a total of 925.

Also loaned were walkers, radios, hospital beds, and commode chairs.

The club has given out 67 White Canes.

The club has given 71 ink jet cartridges to the NC Lions Foundation, Inc.

The club has donated 1,925 Campbell Soup labels to the NC Lions Foundation, Inc.

The club has spent 1,921 man-hours on the Longview Swimming Pool planning, fund raising, and construction.

The club, along with other organizations, raised \$125,000.00 to build the Longview Swimming Pool.

The club's work to obtain 6 acres of land, build the Recreation Center, tennis courts, softball fields, swimming pool, and playground equipment at today's price would amount to over \$250,000.00.
